'DAYS OF '47'

Village Goes All Out for Utah Birthday

SPRINGDALE, Utah—No other state goes all out to celebrate its birthday as much as Utah.

From Annabella to Yost—in Bountiful, Helper, Jericho, Lehi, Logan, Nephi, New Harmony, Ogden, Orem, Paradise, Pickleville, Salt Lake City and every other hamlet, village, town and city—there's a big birthday party called "Days of '47."

The statewide celebration commemorates the day Brigham Young led his band of Mormon pioneers into the Great Salt Lake Valley, July 24, 1847, and declared: "This is the place!"

This year's 130th anniversary of the founding of Utah is being marked with parades, rodeos, square dances, potlucks in town squares and city parks, cow-milking, butter-churning and weaving contests.

Since July 24 fell on Sunday this year, Salt Lake City and most places are celebrating today. Stores and factories are closed. City, state and many federal employees have a holiday.

Some towns like Springdale, population 226, marked Utah's founding Saturday.

Here in Springdale it was a turn-back-the-clock, old-fashioned party.

The day started with a parade down Main St., the only street in the tiny town sandwiched between spectacular towering red sandstone walls that soar toward the sky at the south entrance to Zion National Park.

Half the townspeople marched, rode floats or horses in the parade. The other half and a scattering of out-of-towners watched from porches, front lawns, from car bumpers and curbstones as the parade passed by.

It may not have been a very long parade, but it sure was lively.

Jeff Ballard, 26, the resident deputy sheriff, started it off in his Washington County sheriff's department green pickup, red lights glowing and siren blaring.

Nine women of the local Lioness Club in pioneer bonnets and gingham dresses sat on folding chairs in the back of a truck singing hymns in their float entitled "Take It to the Lord in Prayer."

The truck pulled a small flat-bottom trailer decorated in napkins and crepe paper. In the trailer Holly McCutchen, 8, and Anneliese Heyder, 9,

Teresa Firm, 4, holding her doll "Rub-a-Dub," poked her head out of her covered wagon "Westward Ho!" now and then to see what was going on. Her mother, Grace Firm, pulled Teresa along Main St. in the covered wagon, a white sheet over wires mounted on Teresa's red wagon.

Jerry (Walking Eagle) Dicus, 56, a Comanche Indian in full regalia, beat his drum and intoned, "Hay yana yana hay yana" from one end of town to the other.

Mike Smith somersaulted on a trampoline pulled by a truck with a crepe paper map of Utah, a float entitled "Utah Really Jumps."

Bobby Chamberlain, 13, carried his skunk, Thumper.

Patsy Graves, 21, and Jarolyn Ballard, 16, on a float called "Pioneer Camp," serenaded boys and girls sitting on bales of hay around a simulated campfire. The two girls sang the old songs: "Home on the Range," "Cool Water" and "My Darling Clementine."

It took an hour for the parade to move through town.

The biggest segment of the parade was the 36 cars and 11 campers and trailers caught at the end as they came out of Zion National Park.

"How much farther are they going?" motorists kept shouting to townspeople.

After the parade everybody went up the hill behind the Latter-Day Saints church to Pioneer Cemetery where the women of the Lioness Club unveiled a bronze plaque mounted on a red sandstone rock with the legend: "In Memory of the Springdale, Utah, Pioneers Who Rest Here."

Shortly before sundown Dan Winder, 72, and the men of the community removed the dirt and tin covering from a whole beef buried 24 hours earlier over apple and cherry tree coals for the annual town barbecue.

The third largest parade in the nation takes place today as part of the "Days of '47" celebration in Salt Lake City featuring 60 floats, 25 bands and hundreds of horse units and marchers as the capital city recalls its pioneer heritage.

Springdale's parade was a far cry from Salt Lake City's, but it was in the same spirit of the biggest birthday celebration of any of the 50 states.

Planning Commission Meeting in Brief

There was a lot of discussion on the two items under consideration. These items will impact all and have to do with

1. Potential changes to the Land Use Code that will be necessary following adoption of the Wildland Urban Interface Zone. Staff contact: Eugenia Akiyom
2. Potential changes to Section 10-18 of the Code to improve water efficiency in landscape. Staff contact: Niall Connolly.

Despite the short agenda, the meeting was nearly two hours long with a robust analysis of what might need changing to the code about landscaping due to the Wildland Urban Interface and its proactive

desire to reduce fires. Thus trees, building materials, etc might be altered from what looks great to fire mitigation emphasis. No final decisions were made and there is more discussion to be had.

Even more attention was paid to improving water efficiency, everything from water features, to watering schedules, to pools, to plants were discussed.

The Beautiful Legacy of Bells-Still Resounding

In the 1980s, Jacque and Jay Bell, attorneys from Salt Lake City, built a home in Springdale.



Though they traveled the world, Zion was the place they chose to return to—a home where their three children could come to know its beauty, history, and magic, and where they spent as much time as possible.

As a young woman, Jacque dreamed of becoming a pilot until her father refused to pay for flying lessons. She then set her sights on the FBI, only to discover the agency didn't hire women. Undeterred, she attended George Washington

University, where she met the love of her life, Jay, and went on to become Utah's first woman lawyer.

Together they shared a deep love of nature and God's creation. The Springdale home they built with such care has been cherished not only by their family but also by countless friends, especially those fortunate enough to watch the sunrise on West Temple from the master bedroom window.



Their legacy now reaches the fourth generation, who still gather in Zion to remember, to love, and to experience what Jacque and Jay taught: how to truly “see Zion,” and maybe even oneself — and others. Look up.

To See Zion — by Jacque Bell

Do go with someone you love—or want to love—because, as the Indians knew, it is an area of peace and beauty that does strange and wonderful things to a person's senses and leaves no Achilles' Heel to stop Cupid's arrow.

Do make at least one stop to the Visitor's Center and look at the relief map to get an idea where the various things are located and their relationship with each other.

Don't let the fact that there are so many majestic mountains diminish the beauty of any single one, but examine each peak and sheer mountain wall as one would each precious gem, if it stood alone.

Look up.

Do see the West Temple just before the sun comes up, as it glows with an inner, rosy light. (Best seen from our bedroom or bedroom patio.)

Do see the Watchman just before the sun sets, as it glows with an inner, rosy light. (Best seen from the North side of the couch in the pit—in a loved one's arms.)

Look up.

Don't expect to ever match the pink-coral-flamingo-peach-rose-blush color of Zion in a paint or yarn store as it can't be captured.

Don't miss the part of the park that is the other side of the tunnel. The Checker-Board-Mesa and rock-swirl formations are an entirely different experience from the park canyon. The medium-short hike immediately on the other side of the tunnel (to the left) is a beautiful walk with a rewarding view at the end.

Do play tapes as you drive through the park. Both Mozart and Beethoven set the atmosphere beautifully and you'll find as you turn a corner, the music will crescendo in perfect accord with the mountains, particularly piano concertos.

Look up.

The Narrows Hike (not the long one through the river that is an overnight hike) is the one with startling beauty any time of day or year and every inch of the way. Don't forget to look up—on both sides. Don't

miss the small, green swamp area, the hanging gardens and the cliffs that lean far out over you with the heavy reds, blacks, and corals that fairly turn into your soul. Colors differ greatly with the time of day but the path is uniformly nice and you could wear your Sunday-for-to-meetin' clothes (although I must admit the one time it got cold and Jay wore his suit jacket he got some weird looks from other 'hikers.') The hanging plants, flowers, ferns, etc. grow all along the rock edges and places where you can't believe they could survive.

Remember if you think the sky is bluer in Zion than anywhere on earth—you are right. (As you enter the Narrows Trail, the blue V at the 'end' of the trail is perhaps the bluest.)

Look up.

Do drive into the canyon at night, turn off lights and be astounded by the number of stars and the huge Milky Way.

Find out for me why the leaves on the trees are always so shiny and freshly polished, whether it is Spring, Winter or when they are yellow in the Fall.

Look up.

Be sure to take a swim, even though a short one, in Emerald Pool but remember: Emerald Pool in the fall is cold.

Emerald Pool in the summer is very cold.

Emerald Pool in the spring is very, very cold.

Emerald Pool in the winter is D---cold.

Do visit Emerald Pool even if you don't swim and regardless of the season.

Do lie flat on the fine sand while there and glory in the sheer, colorful, huge expanse of rock-mountain on your left and the waterfall, whether it is thin and lacey in the fall, full and powerful in the spring or spraying ice stalactites in the winter.

Do not get waylaid in the beauties and fun of the lower falls and miss going to upper Emerald.

Unless it is the only time you can go, avoid the park in the abominable months (those months of July and August when it is hot and loaded with tourists.)

Do walk along the road through the park—the full thing—in installments. (except in the abominable months) and look up, look up, look up. You'll see beauties you never dreamed existed as you drive.

If your stay in Zion is long enough you can:

Drive to Bryce for lunch.

Drive to Grand Canyon for the day.

If you are there during the abominable months, do wade, swim or merely slosh in the river.

Try to ignore the people, campers and cars—the park is still beautiful.

Hike *early*, or take the shady Hidden Canyon trails.

Take back roads to avoid tourists.

Hie ye to Kolob—it's high, cool and a lovely part of the park that is often missed.

Do stand in awe of the Temple of Sinawava before the "altar" and the "pulpit" there and renew (in your own mind) your wedding vows and thank God for that someone you love.

Don't expect the Great White Throne to always be white—it's almost always gray. It is, however, terrific and very often white when seen at sundown, through the Saddle when the only place the sun's rays hit is on its greatness. The traditional view through the Saddle is great but also be sure to look at the Throne from further down the road where you can see it from the bottom up and appreciate the height of the solid rock.

Do your eye exercise and look up until you find and see:

The natural bridge (best seen from the Visitor's Center.)

The board structure that held the cable on the skyline of Cable Mountain.

The small rock granary in the corner of the first infant arch up the road from Weeping Rock.

Do be in good shape before you take the long arduous hikes:

East Rim

West Rim (can take a modified version that is nice.)

From Kolob down through Potato Hollow and ending into the Angels Landing trail.

Angels Landing is a medium-long, (about 3 hours) beautiful hike and experience but is a lot of "up" and the last little part for "experienced hikers only" changes from fun to foolhardy, dangerous and precarious when you attain the 'wisdom' reached at 50 years of age. You then realize that only the angels should go to that point. Avoid the hike during the abominable months or on very hot days. Even from the top of Angels Landing with all the drop offs and beauty below, don't forget to look up.

When in the Temple of Sinawava be sure to notice that it is one of the few places on earth that has complete beauty in all four directions.

Don't miss Weeping Rock, regardless of the season. It's only a hop, skip and jump from your car and whether the waterfall is full or dry, the beautiful green of the valley seen through the sparkling droplets makes you feel all is right with the world.

Do go out when the moon is full. The shapes and silhouettes of the mountains are most powerful. The Temple of Sinawava is rather awesome and when some of the 'locals' hidden up on the hill start howling like werewolves, run, do not walk.

Do tuck some of the peace, serenity, and wonder of God's works and the feeling of love that abounds in the area into your hearts as a souvenir to take home.



Workforce Housing Considerations

Because “time and again studies find affordable housing is a critical first step in changing the course of one’s life”

writes Freda Savan with the Bucks County Herald, Angel Housing Solutions was created in Bucks County, Pennsylvania. Carol Baumhauer is the angel in Angel Housing Solutions who, during her lifetime was a force for good in her community, said the nonprofit’s director. Carol

and Joe Baumhauer picked Springdale as a place where they could enjoy the rest of their lives together, but fate intervened. They did get far enough to acquire a house here, which Joe still owns.

Joe decided to do something of worth and formed the philanthropic Angel Housing Solutions with two other partners with the specific goal of helping others to work their way up and out of the housing trap. They find properties like apartments or duplexes, rent some of the units at market value, then save some units to be rented for free or reduced cost to single, often unhoused, mothers to break the cycle of poverty. “Access to affordable rental housing is the most effective strategy for reducing childhood poverty and increasing economic mobility in the United States,” explains Beveridge and Wisniewska, who serve as members of the Angel Housing Board along with Joe Baumhauer and Chuck Weiss.

This is what Joe and his partners are doing. But there are a lot of ideas being invented by people who want to progress to a better solution to help Americans.

In Jasper National Park, overnight short-term rentals are highly restricted. You can only operate a “Private Home Accommodation” (PHA) in your primary residence. The operator must be an eligible resident of Jasper National Park.

KEY RULES FOR A PHA INCLUDE:

Size: The rental space cannot exceed 45% of the home’s total floor area.

Bedrooms: Maximum of two guest bedrooms.

Parking: You must provide one extra off-street parking spot for each licensed bedroom.

Permits: You need a PHA Development Permit from Parks Canada and a Business License from the Municipality of Jasper.

Garage suites, garden suites, and secondary suites are not made burdensome to build by town ordinances and cannot be used for short-term rentals. This encourages long term rentals which helps alleviate workforce housing problems.

In the Town of Jackson, Wyoming long-term rentals in an Accessory Dwelling Unit (ADU), called an Accessory Residential Unit (ARU) in the code, are generally allowed. In fact, the Town’s regulations are designed to encourage these units as long-term housing, particularly for the local workforce.

A few key points:

- Long-term rentals ARE permitted

- The Town’s planning FAQ specifically states that month-to-month rentals are permitted and recommends advertising them as available only for 31 days or longer to avoid confusion with short-term rental rules.

A fascinating comparison of **Minneapolis-St. Paul** highlighted the effectiveness of decreasing restrictions on housing in order to decrease the cost of housing. Minneapolis allowed greater freedom to build duplexes and similar and their housing costs went down while St. Paul did not and their housing prices continued to spiral upward. This is interesting because it’s such an apples to apples comparison.

The common thread among these municipalities is clear: increasing the supply of rental housing is one of the most effective ways to address workforce housing shortages. If Springdale is genuinely committed to expanding workforce and affordable housing opportunities, it should give serious consideration to owning and operating workforce rental housing rather than relying almost exclusively on private developers.

Utah law provides municipalities with the flexibility to own and rent housing for the workforce without establishing a housing authority or navigating burdensome regulatory requirements. After the initial capital investment, these properties could generate a reliable, long-

term revenue stream for the Town. Day-to-day management could be handled by professional property managers, requiring minimal staff involvement. In the long run, this approach may prove simpler, more cost-effective, and more sustainable than continually searching for private partners willing to build workforce housing.

The Town's current approach often comes at a significant public cost. To induce private development, Springdale has transferred valuable public land to private entities in exchange for workforce housing commitments that are temporary by design. Those units remain restricted only for the duration of the development agreement—typically 20 years or longer—but when that period ends, the affordability requirement can disappear while the public land is gone forever.

The recent Trapper Circle agreement illustrates this concern. Although the workforce housing requirement extends for 50 years, the Town permanently conveyed a valuable public asset in exchange for a guarantee that ultimately expires. By contrast, if the Town retained ownership of the land and developed municipal rental housing, it would preserve the public asset, maintain permanent control over its use, ensure that the housing remains available for the workforce for as long as the community needs it, and create an ongoing source of revenue for future housing initiatives. That is an investment that benefits not only today's workforce but future generations of Springdale residents as well.

Construction Update July 16, 2026

Through July 23, you can expect to see crews, equipment, and traffic control in the following areas:

- SR-9 Milepost (MP) 4 to 5 (Hurricane)
- SR-9 MP 28-29 (Rockville)
- SR-9/Zion-Mount Carmel Highway MP 32-35 (west side of the Zion-Mount Carmel Tunnel)

All work will pause at 3 PM on Thursday, July 23 in observance of Pioneer Day. Work will resume at 9 AM on Monday, July 27.

In Hurricane:

- Crews will continue trenching underneath the roadway, installing junction boxes (conduit connectors that provide access points), and routing conduit around existing utility lines along the shoulder of eastbound SR-9.
- No direct impacts to drivers are anticipated.

In Rockville:

- Crews will be drilling for conduit installation.
- No direct impacts to drivers are anticipated.

In Zion National Park:

- Crews will continue sawing and backfilling the roadway in the Zion-Mount Carmel Highway roadway to install fiber conduit and junction boxes.
- Traffic will be reduced to one lane controlled by portable signals and flaggers.
- **Visitors should anticipate moderate traffic delays.***

heads up: work in Springdale is expected to begin July 27, 2026. Please anticipate moderate delays with one-way traffic and pedestrian detours.

What to Expect

- **Outside Zion National Park:** Daytime work Monday through Saturday, except holidays
- **Inside Zion National Park:** Daytime and nighttime work Monday through Thursday, except holidays, and delays up to 12 minutes
- Lane shifts and restrictions
- Heavy equipment, crews, and support vehicles

Motorcyclist, Cyclist, and Driver Safety Information

Please use caution and prioritize safety while traveling through the construction area. Avoid any equipment in roadway shoulders over the Independence Day holiday while work is paused.

- **Stay alert** and watch for any lane shifts, crews, equipment, and posted signage.
- **Avoid distractions** by refraining from using mobile devices while traveling through the project area.
- **Maintain a safe following distance** from the vehicle in front of you to allow for sudden stops or changes in traffic flow.

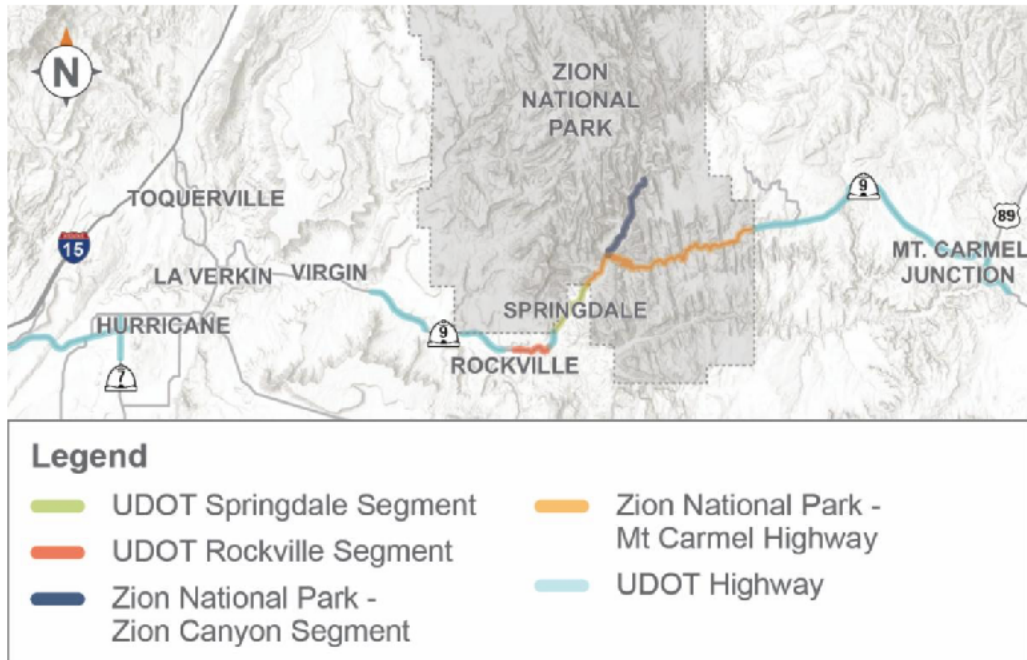
Project Overview

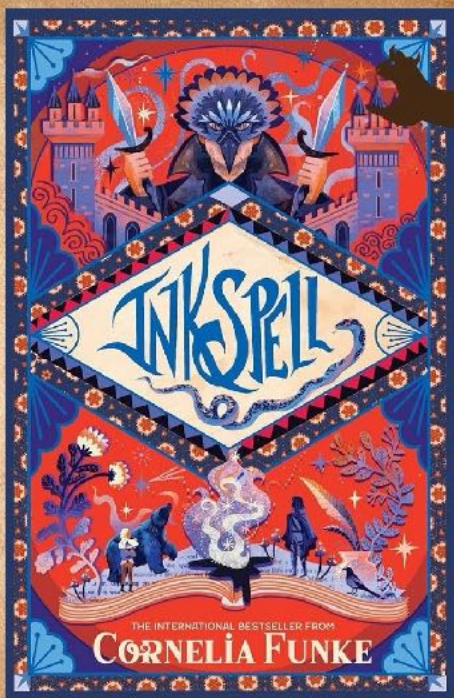
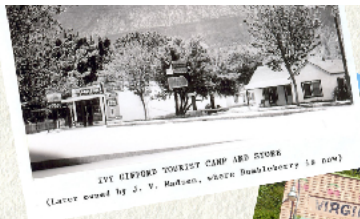

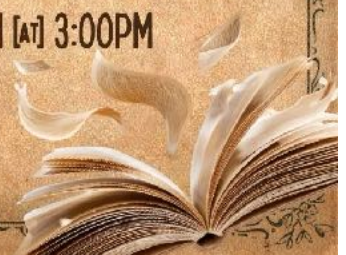

Bitten in Springdale?

An invasive mosquito has moved into your neighborhood (Specifically St. George, Santa Clara, Washington, Hurricane, & Springdale). It appears it is here to stay, as its eggs can survive the mild winters to hatch at the first sign of water and warm weather. The *Aedes aegypti*, an urban dwelling container mosquito, loves to hang out in yards and neighborhoods - close to people.



Be proactive to prevent this mosquito in your Spring cleaning. "Fight the Bite" Checklist:

Eliminate Standing Water Sources by:

- Removing Clutter
- Ensuring that all containers have holes to drain or are tipped

- Checking for sprinkler fed sources
- Turning over rain fed sources
- Checking boats and covers
- Adjusting watering amounts and fixing leaks
- Tightly covering rain barrels

Allow Site Inspections of: (Call to schedule)

- Ponds
- Ornamental Water Features – Especially non-functioning water features
- French drains

Mosquito control crews will be inspecting, trapping, and treating in the affected areas

Aedes Aegypti

- They are usually found in containers in residential areas and bite any time of day.
- They mainly bite humans, usually around areas with thin skin, like ankles and wrists
- They can carry diseases that aren't native to Utah, but they have not been known to carry any diseases in Washington County.

Characteristics & Behaviors

- The mosquito is black with white patches and banding.
- They stay relatively close to where they hatch out, but they can fly as far as a block away (in a lifetime).
- They lay eggs on the sides of containers, and they will hatch out when water is reintroduced, and emerge as adults in as little as 4-5 days.

ZION ROUTE INFORMATION

SunTran bus service has a new public transit route connecting St. George to Zion National Park! The 42-mile route, with stops in St. George, Washington, Hurricane, La Verkin, Virgin, and Springdale, aims to reduce traffic congestion while providing an affordable and convenient travel option.

Buses operate Monday through Saturday from 5:40 a.m. to 10:30 p.m.

Fares cost \$5 for each one-way trip, with an unlimited monthly pass available for \$100 **ALTHOUGH PARKING AT THE 'PARK AND RIDE' IN VIRGIN IS FREE** according to Mayor Bruno.

Riders are encouraged to be at stops at least 5 minutes early. Stop schedules may fluctuate a minute or two ahead or behind the listed stop time, depending on traffic.
